## PARENTING IDEAS

This week's Parenting Ideas article features some tips and advice for our dads, especially seeing you've just celebrated

your big day in the year. Dads, if you want to give something to your child, then read the information below and pretty soon you will know that you've given your child a great head start in life. ## Why Dads should Read to Their Kids

Sure we know dads are great. But did you know that beyond their BBQ-ing, football-coaching, and lawn-mowing skills they also play an important role in their child's literacy too? This month, as we celebrate fathers, we also salute Dad as a reading role model too.

While most dads would agree that reading is an important shared activity to do with their kids, the majority, according to "Booktrust", the United Kingdom's leading literacy organization, don't read with their kids. Their research uncovers that only one out of eight fathers takes the lead with reading to their children. The findings are worrisome because fathers' involvement in their child's reading is proven to boost academic success and leads to improved social and emotional well-being.

James Patterson, who started writing for children in 2005 in order to encourage his son to read, created his own website, ReadKiddoRead, (http://www.readkiddoread.com/) to help dads find books to read with their children. "If we can get children reading and enjoying books, we open up a whole world of possibility to them," he says. "I believe that dads have a huge role to play in encouraging their children to read. We need to give fathers the support they need in reading to their children. If I can help dads to understand their role in making books and reading more important in children's lives, I'll be a happy man."

Studies, in fact, show that boys who are read to by their fathers scored significantly higher in reading achievement, and, when fathers read recreationally, their sons read more and scored higher than did boys whose fathers did little or no recreational reading.

When dads read with their kids, they share the story experience together and bring their own perspective to the reading, which will differ from a mother's perspective. Books are stepping stones for children to understanding the wider world beyond their door. Adults learn about the humankind through books and it's no less so for children.

Reading with their children also helps fathers to see the world through their child's eyes. As well as teaching kids about the world, reading to children teaches dads about their children. Through reading, a parent learns what their child finds funny, scary, mean, and kind and can also be clued into what their child knows and what needs further explaining.

But the benefits of dads reading to their children go well beyond the academic and can be as positive to the dad as the child. After a hectic day at work, reading is a wonderful way for dads to relax with their kids and focus on their child. <u>It's a time to take a break from life's distractions and engage fully with their child.</u>

There are many great reasons that dads should read to their kids. Probably the biggest reason of all is that it is a wonderful way for dads to get closer to their kids and, in turn, create a lifetime of cherished memories. But most of all, reading is a shared endeavour between <u>all</u> the adults in a child's life—and a shared joy.

## Here are some tips for Dads to get them reading with their kids.

- Reading is not only for bedtime. A book over breakfast is a fun way to start the day.
- It's extra special when dads share their favorite childhood books with their children. If dad doesn't remember his favorite book, then grandad probably remembers....
- Let Dad pick out the books. Mums tend to pick out similar books to read time and time again—books that perhaps they like or think their children will like. A dad let loose in a library may come back with a very different book collection to introduce to their kids.
- Reading with kids doesn't only mean reading books.
   Comics, graphic novels, non-fiction books such as Australian Geographic's Deadliest Animals and kid magazines are great reads.
- Why not trade off library days? One week its Mum's turn, the next it's Dad's turn to take a trip to the library.

- For kids ready to stretch into longer fiction, nothing beats the anticipation of reading a book with Dad—chapter by chapter. The Chronicles of Narnia, The Secret Garden, Peter Pan, or the Harry Potter series are just those sorts of reads.
- When kids are interested in reading on their own, dads can still stay involved by reading what their kids are reading and then talking about it together. Many middle-grade (and older) titles are just as entertaining for dads as they are for kids!

So, I here you say, what if there is no father figure in my family. Well, we're not saying Mums don't do a great job, you do, but if there is a father figure in the household, get him involved in your child's reading as well. We already know mum's do a great job supporting kid's reading.

Check out the accompanying "snippets" from our Prep and Year 1 students. If you Dads had any doubt about how much love your kids have, read on! Enjoy the laugh and tears!



## Father time is valuable time

On Father's Day it's worth reflecting on how good fathering matters. It matters to mothers. It matters to men. And importantly it matters to children.



"He's a bit of a rascal!"

This is how Prince William, the Duke of Cambridge described his new born son in a recent televised interview.

Watching the interview it's apparent that Prince William is totally smitten by his son. He is a changed man. As any dad knows, there's no turning back.

Early indications are that the Duke of Cambridge is going to be a modern, hands-on dad who wants to be an active participant in the life of his son. It was he who carried the baby from the hospital to greet the media pack, and it was he who put the baby capsule in the back seat of the car before heading home. "I'm a hands-on dad" was the message beamed around the world. Good on him.

## Building up frequent father points

Prince William is typical of many modern dads. Gone are the days when the only relationship many men had with their children was through their wives. Men, increasingly, recognise that their effectiveness is dependent on first-hand interactions with their kids. That means their presence is needed far more than any presents they may provide for their kids.

For some dads first-hand interactions with children are easier said than done. Family separation, work circumstances and busy lifestyles are all factors affecting their capacity to become involved in their children's lives.

In these circumstances it's important that men maintain an emotional attachment to their kids; do their best to know what's going on in their children's lives; and respond appropriately to the developmental imperatives of their children.

## The impact of fathering on children


Good fathering matters.

It matters to mothers as a supportive father makes a mother's life easier.

It matters to girls. Good fathering has been linked to higher confidence levels in girls, particularly during the tricky adolescent years. The notion of a father who is present, available and attentive affords a sense of security to a girl, which is necessary for healthy development.

Dads are also the first introduction to the world of men for girls so it's important that fathers treat their daughters with gentleness and respect, but also encourage them to be assertive. In a sense, fathers teach their daughters how









they should expect to be treated by males as they get older.

Good fathering matters to boys. They learn their first lessons of manhood from their dads. Early primary-aged boys usually want to spend a great deal of time with their dads. Steve Biddulph, author of Raising Boys, describes this phenomenon as 'father-hunger' and suggests that dads need to be around their sons in the primary school years so they can 'download the software' of how to be male.

The father-son relationship during adolescence can be problematic. While teen boys seem to be hard-wired to challenge their fathers, most desperately want their dads to be proud of them. Teen boys need a dad who can be firm when needed as they don't always make great decisions. They need a dad who remembers the awkwardness and insecurity of being a teenage boy themselves. And they relate best to dads who don't take themselves too seriously. The judicious use of humour, particularly with boys, is a great fathering strategy.

## Fathering matters to men

And, of course, involved fathering matters to men. Most

health scales state a healthy relationship with their children is a predictor of good health and longevity for men, as well as of life satisfaction levels. I suspect there is something relaxing and de-stressing for a man to get into a child's space and time. There is a big kid in most men just busting to get out.

Parental well-being would be the last thing on Prince William's mind as he attends to his young son's needs. It is through these early forays into parenting that Prince William, like countless other men, will find his feet as a dad, and also discover his place in the life of his son.

## Five fathering tips (whether you live with the children's mother or not):

- Go on dates with your daughters.
- Have adventures with your sons.
- Support your partner's parenting.
- Change as your child changes.
- Discipline with firmness and compassion.
